Election of Directors

The provisions for electing members to the board of directors are included in Guernsey-Muskingum's Code of Regulations. If you wish, please call your cooperative for a copy or go to www.gmenergy.com. In summary:

• ELECTION OF BOARD MEMBERS: One or more memberconsumers are eligible for nomination to each available position on the board. Nominees must reside in the cooperative district they are nominated to represent. All nominations are made from the floor at the annual meeting.

• VOTING: Each member shall be entitled to one vote and no more upon each matter submitted to a vote at the meeting. All questions shall be decided by a vote of a majority of the members present at the meeting. The spouse of a member not present may vote on behalf of such a member at the meeting.



One director from each of the following districts will be elected for a three-year term:

District 2 – includes Muskingum County townships of Adams, Highland, Monroe, Perry, Rich Hill, Salem, Salt Creek, Union, Washington and Wayne; and Coshocton



County township of Linton.

District 6 – includes Guernsey County townships of Center, Jefferson, Londonderry, Madison, Monroe, Oxford, Washington, Wills and Salt Fork.

District 7 – includes Guernsey County townships of Jackson, Millwood, Richland, Spencer, and Valley; and Noble County townships of Beaver and Wayne.

Rate revisions to take effect

No one likes rate revisions, especially in these economic times. Here at GMEC over the

last couple of years, we have tightened our belt by postponing vehicle replacements, eliminated positions through attrition, changed employee benefits and bid out our right-of-way clearing program by the mile instead of by the hour. These are some of the larger ways, but there are also many other smaller ways we have stretched your dollars to go further without impacting the reliability of your electric service.

The rate revisions outlined in this article together will increase the average monthly residential bill by about \$2 per 1,000 kilowatt-hours, or about 1.6 percent. Unfortunately, the rising costs we have all been experiencing continue to hit your cooperative. Although these rising costs have slowed recently, only in a few instances have the costs come down.

Your Board realizes the financial

pressure those of us in southeastern Ohio experience, but also realizes our obligation to provide you with reliable electric service. The service availability charge, which is currently \$15 per month, will rise to \$16 per month effective with the April 10 billing. This is a minimal increase (\$1 per month) and will keep the cooperative's distribution costs stable through 2011. This portion of the rate covers the things the cooperative does locally and not that portion which relates to wholesale power costs or high-voltage transmission costs. Those items are recovered separately through the generation and transmission component (GTC).

The GTC, which can change quarterly has been at the 6.65 cents per kilowatt-hour level for the last six months. It recovers only the costs of generating and transmitting power

Did you know?

All electric heaters run at about the same efficiency. This includes old and new portable heaters, baseboard heaters, electric furnaces and even the heaters with fancy full page ads. They all produce about 3,413 BTUs per kWh. Most portable heaters are 1,500 watts. They will produce about 5,100 BTU per hour and use 1.5 kWh every hour. And if you are wondering, kerosene heaters cost more per BTU (at current prices) than electric heaters.

Surprised when you open your electric bill?



Have you ever opened your electric bill and were surprised by the amount of electricity you consumed? Well there are a few simple ways to avoid unpleasant surprises when opening your future electric bills. Here are three tips to make managing your electric bill easier.

1. Read your electric meter; read it every month and read it on the same day of the month. The electric bill you receive from Guernsey-Muskingum is processed monthly based on the reading you provide. If you read your meter at sporadic times of the month you will have some bills that are based on longer time periods and therefore leading to higher consumption for that time and resulting in a higher electric bill. Let's visualize someone using 40 kWh per day for three months.

Worse yet, many of our members do not provide us with readings at all or at least not on a regular basis. They then get a bill based on a computer estimate. The estimate is based on the previous three months' average. If those months are inconsistent readings and computer estimates, the result can be very bad. Also, if we do not receive a

reading for two months, a Guernsey-Muskingum employee will read it and you will be charged \$15. So avoid many problems by marking your calendar and reading your meter on the same day every month. You can call your reading into the GMEC office or enter it on our website, <u>www.gmenergy.com</u>.

2. Enroll in budget billing. Budget billing allows you to know about what your electric bill will be every month. If you enroll in the program, GMEC averages your current bill with your previous 11 months' of consumption. The average is then your month's bill. This is a variable budget and will usually keep your bill within a few dollars each month. At all times your bill will show your actual consumption and compare to your average budget as well as the credit or debit balance you have at that time.

3. Reduce your consumption = Reduce your bill. Take advantage of Guernsey-Muskingum's many avenues for reducing your electric bill by reducing your consumption.
