Generation-and-transmission component remains unchanged

Your electric service bill is made up of various components. More than half of your bill is a generation-and-transmission component (GTC). This is used to cover all the costs of generating electricity and transmitting it to substations to be used by the cooperative's members. The last time the GTC was changed was with the November 2012 bill. Since that time, it has been at the 8.10 cents per kilowatt-hour level. Looking ahead and projecting the rate for the next three months, we do not anticipate any change in the GTC.

No coverage of local expenses is included in the GTC charge. The GTC will continue to be revised quarterly, if necessary.

To keep your electric bills accurate and catch any problems sooner, be sure to turn in an accurate meter reading every month. Try to read your meter on the same day every month. Meter readings can be sent in with your payment, called into the GMEC office 24 hours a day or entered on our website at www.gmenergy.com.

Keeping cool and staying cheap

There is no doubt that using air conditioners to keep cool comes at quite a cost. If your home is too hot in the summer, there are many ways you can help keep the heat out of your house and keep your electric bill cool at the same time. Planting trees, for instance, is one of the best ways to diffuse the hot summer sun before it enters your home. I lost a large tree on the west side of my house, which shaded it from 1 p.m. on; I could not believe the difference it made in the heat in our home and the cost of running my air conditioner. But a surprising amount of heat comes from inside your home.

The biggest sources of internal heat gain are lights and appliances. Reducing their use will save electricity and keep your home cooler. In humid climates, moisture that is released by cooking, bathing and other activities will make it harder for air conditioners to cool your home. A drier home feels more comfortable.

Here are some easy ways to keep cool in the summer and help your power bill also.

 Replace standard incandescent light bulbs with compact fluorescent light bulbs. The electricity used by standard bulbs produces 10 percent light and 90 percent heat. Also, compact fluorescent lights are cheaper to operate. LED lights operate even cooler.

- Schedule heat-producing chores like baking or doing the laundry after the hottest part of the day.
- Use kitchen and bathroom fans to remove heat and moisture during and after cooking and bathing.
- When replacing appliances, buy those with the ENERGY STAR® label.
 These appliances conserve energy and release less unwanted heat.
- If you are home during the day, use a room fan to create a cooling breeze.
- If you live in an area where evenings are cool, don't forget about the cheapest cooling method of all. Open your doors and windows or run window fans — this will move cool evening air through your home for almost no cost.
- Close windows in the morning while the house is cool and close the curtains or blinds to keep the sun's heat out.
- · Prepare meals outside on the grill and keep the heat out.
- Shut off heat-producing appliances like computers and TVs when not in use.

Budget Billing plans available

Do your electric bills go up and down with the changing seasons? Would you prefer to pay approximately the same amount each month? If so, Guernsey-Muskingum may have a budget billing plan for you.

The cooperative offers two budget billing plans: the **fixed budget** and the **levelized budget**.

Fixed budget

Under the fixed budget plan, the cooperative estimates your monthly use based upon a 12-month average. This average is then used to calculate the bill that you will pay over the next 12-month period. Members typically pay the same amount every month. This amount may be adjusted periodically by the Member Accounting department to prevent either a large positive or negative balance from accumulating on the account.

Levelized budget

The levelized budget does not result in exactly the same budget payment each month. The cooperative adds the current month's consumption to the previous eleven months' use, and an average monthly kilowatt-hour figure is determined. This amount is used to calculate the budget billing amount for the month. This means that the budget amount is actually adjusted monthly, but usually remains within a few dollars of the previous month's budget. As with the fixed budget, the levelized budget amount may need to be adjusted periodically to prevent a large positive or negative balance from accumulating. The levelized budget can only be offered for accounts that have 12 months of billing history.

The benefit of both budget plans is to minimize or eliminate large swings in your bill that can be caused by the change of the seasons. If either of these budget plans appeals to you, and your billing account is current, just call the Member Accounting department at 740-826-7661 or 1-800-521-9879 and ask to be placed on budget billing. To remain on either budget plan, the budget amount billed must be paid in full each month.

One phone call is all it takes.
